**Agenda Item Title:** Resolution Authorizing the Ingham County Agricultural

Preservation Board's 2009 Budget

**Submitted by:** Ingham County Agricultural Preservation Board

<u>Committees:</u> LE , JD , HS , CS X , Finance X

<u>Summary of Proposed Action</u>: This resolution authorizes the Ingham County Agricultural Preservation Board's 2009 Budget. This budget allows the Agricultural Preservation Board to begin implementing the Ingham County Farmland Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance to begin purchasing conservation easements from landowners in 2009.

In August 2008, Ingham County voters approved a millage of 0.1400 mills (\$0.14 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of ten (10) years (2008-2017) for the purpose of purchasing conservation easements to protect farmland and open space. Under the most conservative estimate, assuming the cost of a conservation easement for the average farmland or other space land in Ingham County is \$2,500/acre and the landowner donates 25% of the value of the conservation easement, 4,963 acres of farmland and an additional 1,173 acres of open space land can be protected over this 10 year time period.

#### **Financial Implications:**

The proposed budget is attached. Estimated total revenues and expenditures are \$1,565,260. Expenditures for the consulting contract are limited to 5% of millage revenues, the remainder of the funds will be used for purchasing conservation easements (\$1,364,322), and related activities.

### **Other Implications:**

It should be noted that it is likely that most easements will be purchased at less than their true value due to the landowner making a "donation" equal to some percentage of the easement's value. This "donation" is not reflected in the proposed budget due to the fact that the County will never actually take in any of the funds from this "donation", instead the landowner indicates that he/she is willing to accept less than 100% of the easement's value. For example, an easement valued at \$100,000 with a 25% landowner "donation" simply results in the county purchasing the easement from the landowner at a value of \$75,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the adopted budget is based on current estimates of revenues and expenditures, and that the Board of Commissioners may find it necessary to adjust budgeted revenues and expenditures from time to time during the year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Controller/Administrator is hereby authorized to make budgetary transfers within the various funds and authorize expenditures in accordance with the budgetary procedures established by the Board of Commissioners in Resolution #90-274, as amended by Resolution #94-93 and #04-253.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the expenditures shall not be incurred in excess of the individual budget adopted herein without first amending the budget pursuant to the budgetary procedures established by the Board of Commissioners in Resolution #90-274, as amended by Resolutions #94-93 and #04-253.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all purchases made with funds appropriated in this budget shall be made in conformance with the Purchasing Procedures Manual, as adopted and amended by the Board, and that these budgeted funds are appropriated contingent upon compliance with the Purchasing Procedures Manual.

As you know, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners has changed the way that community agency funding is allocated for 2009. For 2009, the Controller's Office has determined specific recommended funding levels for each applicant agency. Attached to this memorandum is a spreadsheet detailing the Controller's recommended funding levels for each applicant for the 2009 community agency appropriation. The 2009 community agency books containing the applications from each agency were distributed at the October 28, 2008 Board of Commissioners' meeting. Community agency applications will also be available on the County's web page (www.ingham.org under 'What's New'). **Please bring the books to the following November 2008 liaison committee meetings:** 

- Human Services Committee meeting Monday, November 3, 2008
- Finance Committee meeting Wednesday, November 5, 2008

The recommended funding levels for each agency were determined using the criteria set forth in Resolution #08-197 (see attached). Thirty-four (34) agencies requested a total of \$277,828, and \$202,265 is included in the 2009 budget for community agency funding. Agencies who met the most significant of the criteria – "Meeting Basic Needs" – are recommended to receive approximately a 78% increase from 2008, up to a limit of their requested allocation, with the exception of Legal Services of South Central Michigan whose funding level was capped by Resolution #08-197. Those agencies not "Meeting Basic Needs" are recommended to receive an appropriation equal to the one they received for FY 2008, with the exception of Ingham Conservation District, which is not recommended for funding at this time.

WHEREAS, since 1978, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners has provided financial support to various non-profit community organizations that provide a broad range of services for the purpose of advancing the County's adopted long-range objectives; and

WHEREAS, over the years the community agency process has grown to over 30 applicants requesting funding, with a total request of over \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners desires to make the process of awarding community agency funding more efficient and effective; and

WHEREAS, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners identified the following area of priority emphasis in Resolution #08-116:

"The Ingham County Controller/Administrator will score and rank Community Agency applications based on a set of criteria approved by the Board of Commissioners and make a recommendation on specific funding levels for each applicant to the Human Services Committee."

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners authorizes 2009 applications for community agency funding to be evaluated based on the attached ranking criteria.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Controller/Administrator is authorized to evaluate, rank, and determine funding levels for each applicant as a recommendation for approval by the Human Services Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, no agency shall receive more than 10% of the total available funding for community agencies in FY 2009.

### 2009 Community Agency Ranking Criteria

These criteria are ranked in the order in which they will be used to judge each proposal - #1 is most important, #6 is least.

### 1. The extent to which the proposal directly contributes to addressing the County's long-term priority of "Meeting Basic Needs".

- a. Does the proposal directly address specific challenges faced by Ingham County residents that may be brought on by, or exacerbated by, the current economic climate; including, but not limited to problems such as homelessness, unemployment, poverty, domestic violence, alcoholism, drug abuse, etc?
- b. Does the proposal provide basic necessities for those in need, such as food, clothing, and shelter or help to provide assistance in obtaining such things as household utilities, job skills and transportation that are needed by families and individuals?

### 2. The extent to which the proposal leverages other sources of funding.

- a. What other funding sources are being leveraged, including state, federal, other non-profit and private sources?
- b. Will this funding be used as a match for a larger grant or to leverage other funding?

### 3. The degree to which the proposal demonstrates collaborative approaches to program and service delivery.

- What other agencies and organizations are participating in the proposed project?

### 4. The extent to which the proposal demonstrates creativity and innovation.

- a. Does this proposal represent proven "best practices" in its particular subject?
- b. Does the program produce measurable results?
- c. Has this proposal ever been tried before?
- d. If the proposal is not new, then what is the track record of success, has there been a positive impact on the community?

### 5. The number of years the agency has received County funding (fewer years = higher rating).

- This will be a factor from FY 2010 forward. 2009 is a transition year for this criterion, as agencies will be put on notice for next year. How this will be scored in 2010 has yet to be determined.

### 6. Timeliness in submitting the proposal.

- a. Were deadlines (June 6, 2008) to submit the proposal met to a reasonable standard?
- b. Was the proposal complete when submitted?

### RESOLUTION TO EXPAND THE SIZE OF THE INGHAM COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION

### **RESOLUTION #08-**

WHEREAS, the Ingham County Road Commission provides a valuable service to Ingham County residents; and

WHEREAS, by statute, the size of Road Commissions has been limited to three (3) members; and

WHEREAS, effective January 3, 2007, the County Road Law (MCL 224.6) was amended to allow County Board of Commissioners to increase the size of Road Commissions from three (3) to four (4) or to five (5) members; and

WHEREAS, a larger governing body provides for more diversity in representation and allows for the consideration of a broader range of viewpoints in the decision-making process.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Board of Commissioners shall expand the size of the Ingham County Road Commission from three (3) to five (5) members effective January 1, 2009.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the initial term of the two new members will be staggered with one term expiring December 31, 2010 and one term expiring December 31, 2014.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a public hearing was held on October 28, 2008 before the Board of Commissioners at 7:30 pm in the Board of Commissioners' Room, Ingham County Courthouse, Mason, Michigan for the purpose of hearing any interested persons on the proposed increase in membership on the Ingham County Road Commission.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to the Statute, notice of the public hearing was posted at least twenty eight (28) days before the hearing date.
